How does the rest of the globe wake up?


In most cultures breakfast tends to be a quicker meal than others. Most cultures tend to use scaled down versions of their traditional breakfasts & other larger meals for breakfast. In Brook Street, people with different cultural heritages may have different breakfasts. This powerpoint (slides 3 to 9) shows examples of 'traditional' breakfasts from different cultures.

Watch and discuss the next 4 slides (10 to 13) and then in groups, following research and using the information provided in the notes of Interviews (G6a) with people who live and work in Brook Street, about where they originally came from, design a powerpoint slide (in the style of slides 12 to 15) to add to this presentation, to show the traditional meals, flag and map of the country for a place people in Brook Street originally came from.

Activities Shop front

Plan, design and create shop front for their intended business on Brook Street (Dragons' den link)





A street of Shop fronts

Ask the children to take a photograph of the front of individual shops or use a photograph provided.

The photograph of each individual shops can be made to open as the front door of the shop. This can open to reveal, through drawings, pictures and text, what is sold by this shop and why.

If each child takes an individual shop front, then the whole of Brook Street can be displayed on the classroom walls.







Cook food from different places in the world

which might be served in a restaurant on Brook Street

- Ask the children: What is cuisine? Think, pair, share
- 2 Discuss as a whole class.
 - Cuisine is a characteristic style of cooking practices and traditions, often associated with a specific culture.
 - Cuisines are often named after the geographic areas or regions from which they originate.
- 3 In groups select a particular cuisine (see below)
- Over several weeks, in groups, research cook books and online recipes and find a simple recipe to cook one of the following:
 - a Turkish dish
 - a Chinese dish
 - a Bulgarian dish
 - a Welsh dish
 - an Indian dish
 - an English dish etc.
- Source the ingredients and cook the dish(es).

Share, eat and enjoy!







Write a menu for a new 'global' restaurant opening on Brook Street, which is going to celebrate food from around the world, particularly from places where the residents and business people have connections.

- For example, the appetizers could be from Turkey, the starter from China, the main course from India; the dessert from Bulgaria, the cheese plate from different countries round the world and drink from Turkey.
- Divide the class into 6 groups, with each group taking part of the menu to research and pull together for a menu. Try to ensure the English translation of the name of the dish is included. A photograph of the dish would also be useful to the customer. Each course would require at least 6 choices. Some examples:

Appetizers could be from Turkey

- Yoghurt Dip (Cacik)
- Turkish Hummus (Foodista)
- Smoky eggplant dip (Patlican Ezmes) Etc.

Starters from China:

- Hot & Sour Soup
- Crab Meat & Sweetcorn soup
- Chicken and sweetcorn soup Etc.

Main courses from India

• Etc.

Desserts from Bulgaria

Etc.

Cheese plate from different countries round the world (6 cheeses)

Etc.

Drinks from Turkey:

- Apple Tea
- Turkish coffee Etc.
